Although bills have not yet been filed, we will continue to work toward a COLA bill for ALL retirees. Last year we were successful in helping the lower income retirees with a one-time supplemental check.

I will continue to keep local leaders updated on any pension bills that are filed in the 2023 Legislative session.

retired teachers became so popular that non-educators sought the same member benefits. Therefore, eleven years later, in 1958, Dr. Andrus reached out to a broader audience by founding AARP (then known as the American Association of Retired Persons). In 1982, the two associations merged at the national level and NRTA became a division of AARP.

NRTA is America's leading national organization representing the interests of more than 850,000 working and retired educators. A network of state-based Retired Educators Associations collaborate and provide strategic support to protect educators' financial security and foster volunteerism.
