What is the NHREA?

The NHREA (New Hampshire Retired Educators Association) is an organization open to any retiree who was involved in education. Members include teachers, administrators, and school support personnel. The group is affiliated with the NRTA (National Retired Teachers Association) and AARP.

It was founded in 1952 to promote the economic, social and professional welfare of retirees. Currently there are more than 2000 members in the organization.

There are 18 local units under the guidelines of the state group. Many of these regional units are presently disbanded. The state group is governed by an Executive Board made up of officers, committee chairs and local presidents.

NHREA Mission Statement

"The mission of the NHREA is to advocate for the retired educators in the preservation of their retirement benefits and to support future educators through our scholarship program."

The Challenges We Face

A group is only as strong as its membership. Right now membership is not increasing as it must to stay strong. Local units are disbanding. Some of this started during the pandemic when members weren't comfortable meeting in large groups. Unfortunately now that we are able to meet face-to-face many of the local units have not started up again.

Our group membership is aging. It has been a challenge to bring in younger retirees. Newer retirees may be looking for something that is not offered by the NHREA. One challenge is to find out what this is.

Finding new members has been an ongoing challenge. Privacy laws and practices have changed. School districts are reluctant to share retiree information. This means that we are relying on word-of-mouth to gain new members.

When retiree related legislation is open to public input a strong presence by those affected may possibly make a difference. Retirees contacting their state representatives lets them know that we merit attention.

What can Be Done?

Each year the NHREA has a General Membership meeting. This is held in the spring. This is a chance to hear updates in state legislation, meet other members and discuss and vote on new initiatives. The larger the membership the stronger the group. Please come to the meeting. The time, place and date will be in the Spring newsletter.

Remember when that was the discussion the first week back at school? Now that we have retired many people — most likely those not yet retired - liken it to an extended summer vacation.

According to Transamerica Center for Retirement Studies 57 percent of American workers plan to continue working in retirement, with 36 percent going part-time and 21 percent full-time. Some say they are working because they need the income while others say they just like to keep busy. Whatever the reason, that is a significant portion of retirees.

In Penacook, NH there is a charter school staffed primarily with retirees from the Merrimack Valley school district. CSI (Competencies, Skills, and Interests) Charter School is a public charter school for 17 to 22-year old students. Their website states: "It is the mission of CSI Charter School to provide a small, non-judgmental, competency- based academic environment targeting independent, self-motivated high school students. CSI creates an opportunity to meet high academic standards through an individualized program that enables them to earn a high school diploma and transition to a work setting or continue their education at the post-secondary level." CSI also partners with NHTI to allow students to take college courses to meet their competencies.

The co-administrators, James Gorman and Chris Barry are former

administrators in the district. Retired coaches include Linda Fanny - English, Dave Anderson - Math, Harvey Black - Math & Science, Larry Boucher - Math & Science, Ryan Brandt - Science, Seelye Longnecker - Social Studies, and Tracey Stevens - Math. These retirees are the backbone of the school.

There are many charter schools in NH that are always looking for teachers/coaches. If you are interested in some part-time work, reach out to them and see if you would be a good fit.

MY TURN, Inc. (a non-profit organization) seeks self-motivated and compassionate tutors to assist adult education students. Candidates from all academic backgrounds are encouraged to apply, however, there is a strong need for math and English language tutors.

Duties include:

- Working with individual or small groups of students and supporting their use of online learning platforms.
- Building and maintaining rapport with students, which may include reaching out to students via telephone.
- Option to work with students outside of our classroom/office.

Volunteers must commit to keeping student information confidential and complete a criminal background check. We will provide the forms to you and cover costs. Most of our students are aged 18+, but some students may be aged 16 or 17 and senior citizens.

Start/end dates of internship will normally coincide with the university calendar and last one semester. We are currently approved by NH Dept. of Labor to host an intern and will make all reasonable attempts to support interns in completing projects for academic course credit.
